A deluxe edition of Bolano's complete poetry Perhaps surprisingly to some of his fiction fans, Roberto Bolano touted poetry as the superior art form, able to approach an infinity in which "you become infinitely small without disappearing." When asked, "What makes you believe you're a better poet than a novelist?" Bolano replied, "The poetry makes me blush less." The sum of his life's work in his preferred medium, *The Unknown University* is a showcase of Bolano's gift for freely crossing genres, with poems written in prose, stories in verse, and flashes of writing that can hardly be categorized. Dirigido tanto a profesionales de la Criminología y la Psicología como a todas aquellas personas interesadas en comprender el complejo fenómeno de la violencia contra las mujeres, se propone la existencia de una forma de violencia más sutil o encubierta como base de otras más explícitas y se plantean estrategias de

prevención e intervención para combatir cualquier forma de violencia que pueden sufrir las mujeres por el hecho de serlo. 1738, Carina de Ulloa recibe la carta que cambiará su vida. Su padre, un marino de la Armada Real destinado al Virreinato de Nueva Granada, le pide que se reúna con él en Cartagena de Indias.
